



## Speaker: Władysław Teofil Bartoszewski



**Dr. Władysław Teofil Bartoszewski** holds a PhD in cultural anthropology from the University of Cambridge and an MA in anthropology and history from the University of Warsaw. Having completed his PhD, he worked as an independent research fellow at the University of Oxford and the University of Warwick. A CEO and board member at international financial institutions in Poland (JP Morgan, ING Barings, Credit Suisse), he was also a deputy CEO and board member at Exatel S.A. (2014–2016). Dr. Bartoszewski has held the Władysław Bartoszewski Chair at Collegium Civitas in Warsaw since 2015.

An MP in the Polish Sejm since 2019 (during the ninth and the tenth terms of the Sejm), he was a member of the Polish Coalition parliamentary caucus, a deputy chair of the Foreign Affairs Committee, and a member of the Energy, Climate and State Assets Committee in the ninth-term Sejm, re-elected as deputy chair of the Foreign Affairs Committee in the tenth-term Sejm.

Recently appointed as the Republic of Poland's secretary of state and deputy minister of foreign affairs, Dr. Bartoszewski is responsible for cooperation with the Sejm and Senate as well as for ongoing coordination of parliamentary affairs. He signs the Government's position papers prepared by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs with regard to non-governmental bills. Dr. Bartoszewski represents the Minister of Foreign Affairs when the draft budget law is examined. He also coordinates Asian issues and is responsible for relations with the Jewish diaspora.

## Featured Speaker: Janusz Onyszkiewicz



25 Years in NATO: The Role of Poland in the Transatlantic Community

**Dr. Janusz Onyszkiewicz** received his PhD in Mathematics in 1967 from Warsaw University, after which he became a senior lecturer in that university's Mathematics Institute and the author of several books and papers on mathematical logic and set theory. A member of the democratic opposition since the mid-1960s, Dr. Onyszkiewicz was one of the organizers of "Solidarity" in the Warsaw region in 1980, its national spokesperson until 1989, and a member of its presidium. Following the declaration of martial law in December 1981, Onyszkiewicz was imprisoned for over a year and then rearrested several times.

Dr. Onyszkiewicz was the spokesperson of the "Solidarity" delegation to the Round Table negotiations with the communist authorities in 1989, after which he was elected to and served in the Polish Parliament from 1989 to 2001 and was a member of the Executive Committee of the Inter-Parliamentary Union (1989-1991). He was appointed Deputy Minister (1990-1991) and then Minster of National Defense (1992-1993, 1997-2000) under prime ministers Hanna Suchocka (1992-1993) and Jerzy Buzek (1997-2000), respectively.

President of the Democratic Party from 2006-2009, Dr. Onyszkiewicz served as a member of the European Parliament from 2004-2009 and as its Vice-President and vice chairperson of the Foreign Relations Commission. He currently serves as an expert on defense policy at the Center for International Relations in Warsaw and is the chairperson of the Euro-Atlantic Association Council and an adviser to the Minister of National Defense.

Launched in 1956, The Polish Review has established itself as one of the most distinguished journals in the various fields of Polish studies, a publication that encourages lively scholarly exchange and cutting-edge innovation. The Review authors have included Stanisław Barańczak, Rachel Feldhay Brenner, Zbigniew Brzeziński, Anna Cienciała, Anna Frajlich, Irena Grudzińska-Gross, Fredric Jameson, Dariusz Libionka, Czesław Miłosz, and Antony Polonsky, among others.

The Review is a peer-reviewed multidisciplinary journal, published by the Polish Institute of Arts and Sciences of America in New York in cooperation with the Polska Akademia Umiejętności in Kraków and the University of Illinois Press in Urbana-Champaign. It aims to disseminate new scholarly research in Polish studies broadly understood. To accomplish this goal, the Review publishes original research articles, review essays, book reviews, and annotated translations of documents and literary works.

The Review enjoys a robust international readership. For example, online usage was up by 21% during the fourth quarter of 2023, compared to Q4 in 2022. Overall, the online usage increased by almost 100% between 2018 and 2023, from 47k to almost 90k. These increases do not include electronic delivery of The Polish Review to PIASA members.

**HOW TO SUBMIT ARTICLES:** Manuscripts should be submitted in Microsoft Word via e-mail attachment to the Editor, Halina Filipowicz, at hfilipow@wisc.edu. The length of each submission should be 6,000 to 10,000 words plus notes, tables, etc. Each manuscript should conform to TPR Stylesheet and include an abstract of approximately 250 words. Manuscripts are evaluated in a double-blind peer-review process on the basis of their originality, the scope of research, and the clarity of the thesis, presentation, and conclusions.
